

CLIFTON MANSION

The Clifton Mansion was originally built as a two-story Federal style farmhouse, between 1790 and 1801, by Baltimore merchant Henry Thompson, who served as captain of the Flying Artillery, 3rd Maryland Brigade in the War of 1812. The building was later purchased by famed philanthropist Johns Hopkins and expanded between 1841 and 1853 into a Victorian era Italianate villa that served as his summer estate.

Clifton Mansion features an eighty-foot tower with a commanding view of Baltimore, an extensive arcade which spans the entire length of the South side and wraps around the East and West ends, a massive black walnut Grand Staircase with marble floor in its entrance hall, ornate hand painted walls and ceilings, and intricate plasterwork and woodwork.

The City of Baltimore purchased Clifton Mansion and its grounds in 1895 from Johns Hopkins University. It has been put to many uses ever since, including a headquarters for the Department of Recreation and Parks, and the clubhouse for the golf course. Although the Clifton Mansion fell into considerable disrepair during its years of transition, the building is being carefully restored by Civic Works and the Friends of Clifton Mansion.

The building that once housed Baltimore's famed philanthropist and was the intended location of Johns Hopkins University is once again host to a driving force in the City's improvement. Clifton Mansion serves as the headquarters for Civic Works' community service programs and an important resource for the neighborhoods surrounding Clifton Park. Its main hall now holds an exhibit celebrating the role Baltimore's wealthiest citizens played in creating the City's most celebrated institutions. The Clifton Mansion stands as a testament to Baltimore's long history of philanthropy and a reminder of the need for future generosity.

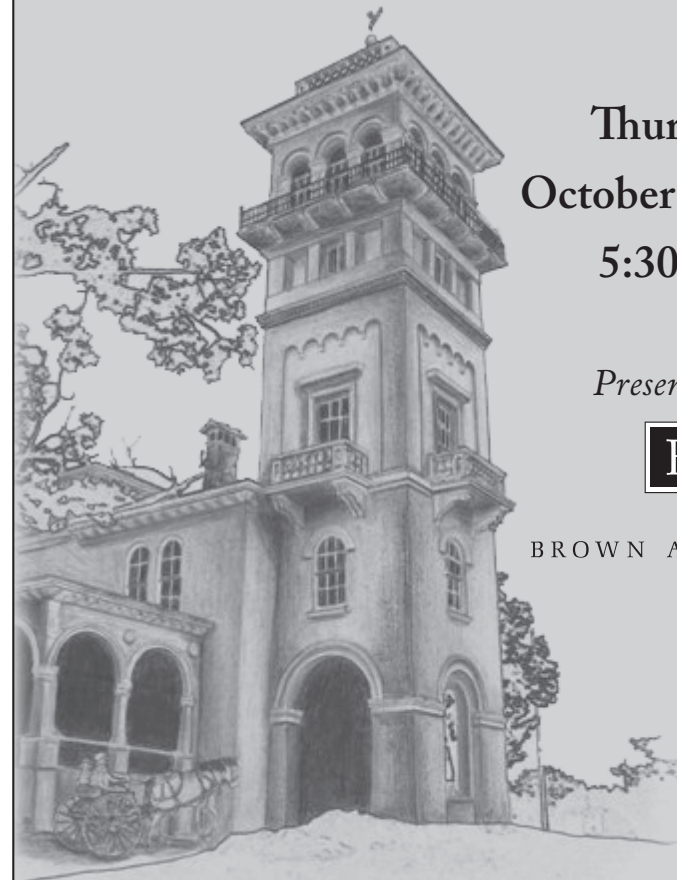

Founded in 1993, Civic Works is Baltimore's urban service corps and an AmeriCorps program. Our mission is to build a future for Baltimore's youth through community service and skills development. Every year, our corpsmembers spend a year or a summer in service to Baltimore, and in return, receive a modest living allowance, an education award that can be used for college or vocational school, and the job readiness and life skills needed to secure and maintain employment.

More than 2,500 young adults have participated in Civic Works, transforming Baltimore's communities while improving their own job skills and education. Our corpsmembers, along with over 28,000 volunteers have:

- converted 163 vacant lots into community gardens
- planted 23,000 trees and 14,000 flowers
- rehabilitated 55 homes for low-income residents
- tutored and mentored almost 17,000 students in the Baltimore area
- and accomplished many other important projects.

SAMUEL HOPKINS

Samuel Hopkins has distinguished himself as one of Baltimore's leading public servants, civic leaders and philanthropists. His opinion has often been sought by community leaders when they were facing difficult issues. Mr. Hopkins is known as thoughtful, but strong; a good listener and even better story-teller; and as an advocate for civility and compassion in times when they seemed in short supply.

He has served as a member of the Maryland House of Delegates; vice president, secretary, and director of Fidelity Deposit Company; and partner at Alex Brown & Sons. Mr. Hopkins also has served on the board of the Baltimore Museum of Art, State Colleges of Maryland, Sheppard and Enoch Pratt Hospitals, Baltimore City Board of Recreation and Parks, the Maryland Historical Society and the Baltimore City Planning Commission. Mr. Hopkins is the great-grandnephew of the Baltimore philanthropist Johns Hopkins.

Mr. Hopkins was a founding board member of Civic Works and has been a driving force in our efforts to restore the Clifton Mansion. His knowledge of history, coupled with his commitment to encouraging public service has made him an effective proponent for saving this building, which is itself, a great metaphor for Sam Hopkins. It is handsome and grand, but with a practical purpose that focuses on building a future for others.

Mr. Hopkins is one of Baltimore's most honored philanthropists and public servants. He will turn 95 on October 18th and we are honored to establish the Samuel Hopkins Lifetime of Service Award in recognition of his invaluable contributions.

Mary Louise Preis

Mary Louise Preis is widely acknowledged in Maryland for her service and leadership in business, government and community volunteer efforts over three decades. Ms. Preis represented Harford County in the Maryland House of Delegates, served as the Maryland Commissioner of Financial Regulation, and was General Counsel for Regulatory Affairs at Citigroup. She recently retired from Citigroup as Vice President for Corporate and Community Relations and continues to serve as a member of the Maryland Racing Commission.

Ms. Preis has demonstrated a lifetime commitment to education and the advancement of women. She has served on the board of the United Way of Central Maryland, Girl Scouts of Central Maryland, the College of Notre Dame of Maryland, the Women Legislators' Foundation and Mercy Health Services, Inc. Ms. Preis was instrumental in the creation of the Maryland Coalition for Financial Literacy and now chairs the Board of Directors of REACH! Partnership, a Baltimore City Transformation School created by Civic Works. Mary Louise Preis exemplifies service and we are proud to name her the first recipient of the Samuel Hopkins Lifetime of Service Award.
